

City Directories at the Ridgewood Public Library

What are City Directories?

City Directories were produced long before the advent of the telephone and remained important into the 1970's. They may include information such as:

- Heads of household
- Occupations
- Local businesses
- Addresses
- Advertisements

Thus they are important research tools for local historians and genealogists.

Ridgewood's City Directories, which cover many towns, are now available on microfilm in the Reference area of the Library. In 2006, the Ridgewood Public Library gratefully received a project grant from the New Jersey Historical Commission, a division in the Department of State, in support of the microfilming of its city directories.

Microfilm copies are available at the Ridgewood Public Library and the New Jersey State Library in Trenton, NJ.

What is Available at the Library

- Miller's Directory for the Village of Ridgewood 1897: Also includes portions of Paramus, Ho-Ho-Kus, Midland Park and Glen Rock. Map of the area is available, along with an alphabetic list of residences and businesses; advertisements; and information about local organizations.
- b Breed's Directory of the Erie Railroad: Information on the towns along the Erie Railroad. Not all towns are covered every year (INC). Each town lists names of residents with occupations and street addresses. Businesses and their proprietors are listed, along with advertisements.

 Can be researched numerically or by person, business or governmental buyer. Details can include occupation, place of occupation, spouse's name, death details and removals are included. Advertisements are listed throughout.
